Local Plan Submitted to State

A local task force comprised of the Yuma County Commissioners and staff, local hospital medical and administration teams, and local city leaders have developed and submitted a plan to begin the process of reopening Yuma County and lifting various COVID restrictions progressively over the coming weeks. The plan

is currently being assessed by the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, so all State orders currently remain in effect in Yuma County.

Our local plan looks to put local government officials and local healthcare leaders into the driver's seat in determining what is most appropriate and most in line with our resources and remove the one-size-fits all lens. We look forward to receiving feedback and approval from the State to allow Yuma County officials to assess the appropriate path forward for Yuma County and our residents.

Oil and Gas Rulemaking Suit Continues

The lawsuit against the State of Colorado Air Quality Control Commission to which Yuma County is a party continues it's path through the court system. The Air Quality Control Commission has filed a motion to dismiss the claim on the proposed grounds that the counties do not have the authority to file a lawsuit against the Air Quality Control Commission. Attorneys from the various counties representing the Western and Rural Local Government Coalition are currently preparing a response which is due to the courts by May 8.

Up next in the Senate Bill 19-181 COGCC rulemaking process are some very vital rules associated with the Colorado Oil and Gas Conservation Commission mission change. With the passage of Senate Bill 181, the mission of COGCC changed from fostering the oil and gas industry in the State of Colorado, to regulating it. The next round of rulemaking will define the overall tone of what that looks like. After a hard-fought discussion, mission change rulemakings have been postponed until July to allow the new Commission to be seated and, hopefully, allow greater public participation in the process when in-person testimony can resume.
