- **Career Pipeline, Round 2** This RFA focuses on awarding grants to increase the number of behavioral health workers. The BHA initiates a second solicitation for Career Pipeline Grants. These grants must structure a pathway for individuals to enter the field, gain education and experience, and advance their careers. They'll provide services to those with mental health or substance use needs.
- Work Based Learning Incentive These grants will support behavioral health apprenticeships, internships, and pre-licensure support. The aim of this effort is two-fold, to increase the number of people with appropriate training and recognized credentials, and establish stronger connections between employers and the emerging workforce.

Co-Responder Expansion

Deadline: November 13, 2023

Purpose: Co-Responder Programs create and foster partnerships between behavioral health professionals and law enforcement. The law enforcement officer and the behavioral health specialist's combined expertise aims to improve de-escalation of situations, deflect individuals away from involvement with the criminal justice system and/or unnecessary hospitalization, and link them to appropriate services.

The Colorado Behavioral Health Administration (BHA) is seeking applicants to create, modify, update, or maintain Co-Responder Programs in Colorado. BHA will provide funds to eligible applicants, including cities or county government agencies, to help Colorado continue and expand the Co-Responder Program.

The Co-Responder Program pairs law enforcement and behavioral health specialists to intervene and respond to behavioral health-related calls for police service. These teams utilize the combined expertise of the officer and the behavioral health specialist to de-escalate situations and help link individuals with behavioral health issues to appropriate services.

Areas of Focus: Criminal Justice

Amount of Funding: Allowable Uses of Funding: The Contractor may use program funds to support, with

prior approval of the Colorado Department of Human Services (CDHS) - Behavioral

Health Administration (BHA), items including but not limited to, the following:

- a. Program personnel and project management and community engagement.
- b. Temporary services and treatments necessary to stabilize a participant's

condition, including necessary housing.

c. Outreach.

- d. Direct costs for services.
- e. Specialized program training.

f. Dedicated law enforcement resources, including overtime required for

participation in operational meetings and training.

g. Training and technical assistance from experts in the implementation of Co-

Responder Services Programs in other jurisdictions.

h. Collecting and maintaining the data necessary for program evaluation.

Project period: Through June 2024

Eligibility: READ FULL ELIGIBILITY DESCRIPTION HERE.

Eligible applicants include cities or county government agencies. Although cities and counties may select an agency to serve as a Project Manager in the implementation of the project, the applicant agency will retain the responsibility for the overall project administration including fiduciary oversight. Eligible applicants are limited to:

a. Cities. Applications may be submitted by the City Council or the Administrative

Office of the City (e.g., City Manager) or police department. In cases in which the City is the applicant, only one (1) proposal per city may be submitted. However, more than one (1) City within a County may submit an application. b. Counties. Applications may be submitted by the County Human Services Department, Public Health Department, Sheriff's Department or County Commissioners. In cases where a County agency is the applicant, only one (1) proposal per County may be submitted.

c. Other Government Entities. Includes other types of city or county administrative departments not included above.

Supporting Coloradans in Recovery Through Non-Clinical Programs

Deadline: February 15, 2024, June 15, 2024

Purpose: The Colorado Health Foundation will provide grants for culturally- and linguistically-responsive programs that support individuals with mental health and/or substance use challenges in accessing nonclinical support services close to home, thus making recovery possible.  - Led by or provided by peers such as a peer support specialist, peer navigator, peer coach, or recovery coach
 - Proposed by organizations who already have experience providing recovery services
 - Responsive to the needs of people in recovery and their families through traumainformed programming
 - Providing support and resources for the mental wellness of peers and staff
- Organizations must provide non-clinical programs that fall under SAMHSA's purpose and/or community dimensions of recovery:

Notice of Special Interest (NOSI): Utilizing Telemedicine or Other Remote-Based Platforms to Develop and Support Treatments for Substance Use Disorders

Deadline: January 8, 2024

Purpose: There is an urgent need for remotely delivered Substance Use Disorder (SUD) treatments to reduce patient burden and for methods to conduct clinical trials remotely. The purpose of this NOSI is to

stimulate research to evaluate the safety and efficacy of telemedicine or remotely provided treatments for SUD, and to develop tools for remote collection of data in clinical trials of treatments for SUD.

Area of Focus: Treatment

Eligibility: NIDA encourages the submission of applications that will rapidly improve the ability to: 1) offer remotely-delivered SUD treatments to patients, including efforts to bring access to difficult to reach populations, and 2) conduct clinical trials of novel treatments using remote patient safety and clinical outcomes monitoring to reduce the need for in-person clinical visits.

Walmart Local Community Grants

- A recognized government entity: state, county or city agency, including law enforcement or fire departments, that are requesting funds exclusively for public purposes and CyberGrants FrontDoor verified.
- A K-12 public or nonprofit private school, charter school, community/junior college, state/private college or university; or a church or other faith-based organization with a proposed project that benefits the community at large, such as food pantries, soup kitchens and clothing closets and CyberGrants FrontDoor verified.
- NOTE: Non-charities, including organizations recognized as 501(c)(4)s, (c)(6)s, and (c)(19)s like homeowner's associations, civic leagues, or volunteer fire companies, are not eligible at this time.
