- **Career Pipeline, Round 2** This RFA focuses on awarding grants to increase the number of behavioral health workers. The BHA initiates a second solicitation for Career Pipeline Grants. These grants must structure a pathway for individuals to enter the field, gain education and experience, and advance their careers. They'll provide services to those with mental health or substance use needs.
- Work-Based Learning Incentive These grants will support behavioral health apprenticeships, internships, and pre-licensure support. The aim of this effort is two-fold: to increase the number of people with appropriate training and recognized credentials and to establish stronger connections between employers and the emerging workforce.

Colorado HIV and AIDS Prevention Program RFA

Deadline: January 16, 2024

Purpose: The CHAPP funding opportunity solicits responses for a new cycle of HIV prevention projects that reflect recent advances in HIV prevention interventions. Specifically, this RFA supports four types of HIV prevention interventions, including:

- 1. Community-focused HIV testing and linkage to services in high-impact settings,
- 2. Navigation and retention to PrEP care for priority populations,
- 3. Innovative community engagement, and
- 4. Syringe service programming

Areas of Focus: Prevention

Amount of Funding: Approximately \$2,500,000 to \$2,800,000 is available to fund projects

Project period: The anticipated term of this project is July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2027. The anticipated term of the initial contracts will be July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025.

Overdose Data to Action Grant Fund

Deadline: December 15, 2023

Purpose: The Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment's Overdose Prevention Program is pleased to announce the availability of funds to enhance evidence-based opioid overdose prevention programming and evidence-informed interventions that have an immediate impact on reducing overdose morbidity and mortality, with a focus on opioid, stimulant, and polysubstance use. The purpose of these funds is to prevent opioid misuse and overdose using existing data to inform evidence-based public health approaches.

Track 1: Harm Reduction

Track 1 funds the implementation and support of selected evidence-based interventions to reduce stigma toward people who use drugs (PWUD) and to facilitate the implementation and uptake of harm-reduction strategies.

Track 2: Community-Based Linkage to Care

Track 2 funds selected evidence-based interventions that facilitate linkage to care, retention in care, and support recovery. Community-based linkage to care focuses on building community capacity to help people with SUD connect to services and stay connected.

Project period: The grant program will be funded through August 31, 2028, pending availability of funds and applicant performance.

Eligibility: Only the following entities will be considered for funding under this RFA:

- Local Public Health Agencies (LPHA)

- Syringe Service Programs

Medication Unites Implementation and Operation RFP

Deadline: December 29, 2023

Purpose: In 2020, 1,477 Coloradans died of drug overdose, a 38% increase from 2019, and the most ever recorded in the state (Colorado Health Institute, 2022). Methadone is an effective treatment for opioid use disorder (OUD), but many barriers including treatment access can prevent people from accessing and maintaining treatment. Signal seeks to contract with an established, licensed Colorado opioid treatment program (OTP) that will implement and operate one medication unit/satellite clinic within any of the Signal's SSPA regions, with the aim of increasing opioid use treatment in a rural area.

Signal's goal is to expand access to OTPs and medication-assisted treatment to underserved communities and rural areas in partnership with the communities they serve.

Amount of Funding: Maximum funding is approximately \$80,000 for the med unit/satellite clinic, including start-up, staffing, operational, and administrative costs.

Project period: Signal expects the project to begin after contracting on February 1, 2024

Eligibility: Signal seeks bids from any certified OTP licensed in the state of Colorado in good standing, irrespective of whether the provider agency is currently or not currently a Signal provider agency partner; however, all OTPs must be licensed in the State of Colorado and must operate the unit within Northeast Colorado (SSPA 1), Metro Denver (SSPA 2), and Southeastern Colorado including San Luis Valley (SSPA 4), and Boulder County (SSPA 7). Purpose: The Reaching Rural Initiative is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and the State Justice Institute (SJI). The Institute for Intergovernmental Research (IIR) is releasing this solicitation on their behalf.

The one-year planning initiative is designed for rural justice and public safety practitioners; public health and behavioral health practitioners; city, county, and tribal leaders; and community groups. The planning initiative empowers rural practitioners to build deeper networks, particularly across sectors; adopt bold solutions to the persistent challenge of substance use and misuse in rural communities; and reimagine how diverse systems with different missions can engage with one another to more effectively serve justice involved individuals with substance use or co-occurring disorders.

Deadline: February 15, 2024, June 15, 2024

Purpose: The Colorado Health Foundation will provide grants for culturally- and linguistically-responsive programs that support individuals with mental health and/or substance use challenges in accessing nonclinical support services close to home, thus making recovery possible. Eligibility:

- Eligible applicants include 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, government agencies, or projects partnering with a nonprofit fiscal sponsor, including:
- Preference will be given to projects that are:
 - o Run by organizations that are peer-led or peer-driven
 - Led by or provided by peers such as a peer support specialist, peer navigator, peer coach, or recovery coach
 - o Proposed by organizations who already have experience providing recovery services
 - Responsive to the needs of people in recovery and their families through traumainformed programming

- o Providing support and resources for the mental wellness of peers and staff
- Organizations must provide non-clinical programs that fall under SAMHSA's purpose and/or community dimensions of recovery:
 - Purpose Conducting meaningful daily activities such as employment, education, volunteering along with having the independence, income and resources to participate in society.

Notice of Special Interest (NOSI): Utilizing Telemedicine or Other Remote-Based Platforms to Develop and Support Treatments for Substance Use Disorders

Deadline: January 8, 2024

Purpose: There is an urgent need for remotely delivered Substance Use Disorder (SUD) treatments to reduce patient burden and for methods to conduct clinical trials remotely. The purpose of this NOSI is to stimulate research to evaluate the safety and efficacy of telemedicine or remotely provided treatments for SUD, and to develop tools for remote collection of data in clinical trials of treatments for SUD.

Area of Focus: Treatment

Eligibility: NIDA encourages the submission of applications that will rapidly improve the ability to: 1) offer remotely-delivered SUD treatments to patients, including efforts to bring access to difficult to reach populations, and 2) conduct clinical trials of novel treatments using remote patient safety and clinical outcomes monitoring to reduce the need for in-person clinical visits.

Walmart Local Community Grants

- A recognized government entity: state, county or city agency, including law enforcement or fire departments, that are requesting funds exclusively for public purposes and CyberGrants FrontDoor verified.
- A K-12 public or nonprofit private school, charter school, community/junior college, state/private college or university; or a church or other faith-based organization with a proposed project that benefits the community at large, such as food pantries, soup kitchens and clothing closets and CyberGrants FrontDoor verified.

• NOTE: Non-charities, including organizations recognized as 501(c)(4)s, (c)(6)s, and (c)(19)s like homeowner's associations, civic leagues, or volunteer fire companies, are not eligible at this time.
