COAC: Opioid Response Strategic Impact Grant

The DOL Opioid Response Unit (ORU) seeks partners that present actionable plans, with clear deliverables and timelines, that provide measurable impact in addressing the serious challenges of the opioid epidemic.

Rocky Mountain Public Health Training Center (RM-PHTC): Mini-Grants

Deadline: February 16, 2024

Purpose: The Rocky Mountain Public Health Training Center (RM-PHTC), which is funded by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), is offering a total of \$60,000 in funding to up to 12 organizations to offer leadership learning opportunities to professionals working in public health or community health.

Types of learning opportunities may include:

- Live or self-paced training
- Virtual or in-person training
- Coaching
- Mentoring

- Single-session or multi-session opportunities

Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant program (JAG)

Deadline: February 27, 2024

Purpose: This program furthers the DOJ's mission by assisting state, local, and tribal jurisdictions' efforts to prevent or reduce crime and violence and to improve the fair administration of the justice system. These funds are for start-up efforts, either to attempt a new project design or to replicate a successful project in a new area.

Areas of Focus: Prevention

Funding Priorities:

- Community-Based Violence Intervention
- Behavioral health programs that prevent and/or reduce criminality related to substance and/or mental health disorders.
- Activities to prevent Motor Vehicle Theft
- Preference will be given to applications that demonstrate collaboration with underserved communities.

Amount of Funding: \$3,744,995 will be available for 2024 JAG subgrant applications.

Project period: The anticipated term of this project is October 1, 2024, through September 30, 2025.

Eligibility: Units of government at the municipal, county and state level, including special districts, and recognized Native American tribal governments, may apply to the Office of Adult and Juvenile Justice Assistance, Division of Criminal Justice, for a JAG grant. The JAG program strongly encourages partnerships, so applications may support projects involving combined teams of agencies at all levels and including non-profit organizations. However, non-profit organizations cannot apply directly for JAG funding. Non-profit organizations may participate as a team member, with the government agency assuming overall responsibility and leadership for a project.

Application Process: Effective with grants that start their 1st year in 2024 or later; proposals (application) for Year 2 continuation funding, may request funding for 100% of the year 1 award (or higher). If the funding request for year 2 is more than the previous year's award, the applicant must provide a clear justification as to why additional funds are needed. Proposals for year 3 continuation funding, must reduce the amount requested to 75% (or lower) of the year 2 award. Proposals for year 4 continuation funding must reduce the amount requested by 50% of the year 3 award.

Applicants with a current grant requesting continuation funding for years 2, 3, or 4, do not have to decrease their requests. If the funding request is more than the previous year's award, the applicant must provide a clear justification as to why additional funds are needed.

Eligibility:

- Eligible applicants include 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, government agencies, or projects partnering with a nonprofit fiscal sponsor, including:
- Preference will be given to projects that are:
 - o Run by organizations that are peer-led or peer-driven
 - Led by or provided by peers such as a peer support specialist, peer navigator, peer coach, or recovery coach
 - o Proposed by organizations who already have experience providing recovery services
 - Responsive to the needs of people in recovery and their families through traumainformed programming
 - o Providing support and resources for the mental wellness of peers and staff
- Organizations must provide non-clinical programs that fall under SAMHSA's purpose and/or community dimensions of recovery:
 - Purpose Conducting meaningful daily activities such as employment, education, volunteering along with having the independence, income and resources to participate in society.
 - Community Having relationships and social networks that provide support, friendship, love, and hope.

SAMHSA: Grants to Expand Substance Use Disorder Treatment Capacity in Adult and Family Treatment Drug Courts

Deadline: April 1, 2024

Purpose: The purpose of this program is to expand substance use disorder (SUD) treatment and recovery support services in existing drug courts. The program recognizes the need for treatment instead of incarceration for individuals with SUDs. Recipients are expected to provide prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery services for individuals with SUD involved with the courts. With this program, SAMHSA aims to improve abstinence from substance use, housing stability, employment status, social connectedness, health/behavioral/social consequences, and reduce criminal justice involvement.

Areas of Focus: Treatment and Recovery

Amount of Funding: \$24,400,000

Project period: Not specified

Eligibility: Eligible applicants are States and Territories, including the District of Columbia, political subdivisions of States, drug courts, Indian tribes, or tribal organizations (as such terms are defined in Section 5304 of Title 25), health facilities, or programs operated by or in accordance with a contract or award with the Indian Health Service, or other public or private nonprofit entities.

Rural Emergency Medical Services Training Grant

Eligibility: Eligible applicants include rural emergency medical service agencies operated by local or tribal governments (fire-based and non-fire based) and nonprofit emergency medical service agencies.
