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SAMHSA: Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment Program

Deadline: April 12, 2024

Purpose: This program (short title SBIRT) provides grants to implement screening, brief intervention, and referral to treatment services for adolescents and adults in primary care and community health settings with a focus on screening for underage drinking, opioid use, and other substance use.

Among other things, this program is intended to expand and enhance the continuum of care for substance use disorder (SUD) services and reduce alcohol and other drug (AOD) consumption, reduce high-cost service utilization, and promote sustainability and the integration of behavioral health and primary care services through policy changes that promote access to generalist and specialist care.

Areas of Focus: Treatment

Amount of Funding: \$995,000

Project period: 5 years

Eligibility: Eligible applicants include states and territories, political subdivisions of states, tribes, tribal organizations, health facilities, programs operated by or in contract with the Indian Health Service, and other public or private nonprofit entities.

Facilities include, but are not limited to:

- Health centers
- Hospital systems
- Health maintenance organizations (HMOs)
- Preferred-provider organizations (PPOs)
- Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs)
- Behavioral health centers
- Pediatric healthcare providers
- Children's hospitals

SAMHSA: First Responders-Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act

Deadline: April 15, 2024

Purpose: The purpose of this program is to provide resources to support first responders and members of other key community sectors on training, administering, and distributing naloxone and other Food and Drug Administration (FDA)-approved overdose reversal medications or devices. Recipients will be expected to establish processes, protocols, and mechanisms for warm hand-off referrals to appropriate treatment, recovery, harm reduction, and other psychosocial resource support services. Recipients will also provide safety education around fentanyl, synthetic opioids, and other drug trends associated with overdoses.

Areas of Focus: Treatment and Recovery

Amount of Funding: \$6,200,000

Project period: Not specified

Eligibility: Eligibility for this program is statutorily limited to states, local governmental entities, and American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) tribes and tribal organizations.

SAMHSA: Building Communities of Recovery

Deadline: April 29, 2024

Purpose: The purpose of this program is to mobilize and connect a broad array of community-based resources to increase the availability and quality of long-term recovery support for persons with substance use disorders (SUD) and co-occurring substance use and mental disorders (COD). Recipients will be expected to support the development, enhancement, expansion, and delivery of recovery support services (RSS) directly to individuals as well as advance the promotion of, and education about, recovery at a community level.

Areas of Focus: Recovery

Amount of Funding: \$6,000,000

Project period: 3 years

Eligibility: Eligibility is limited to Recovery Community Organizations (RCOs), defined as independent, non-profit organizations wholly or principally governed by people in recovery from substance use disorders and/or co-occurring substance use and mental disorders who reflect the community being served.

Rural Emergency Medical Services Training Grant

Deadline: May 1, 2024 (annual grant)

Purpose: The Rural Emergency Medical Services Training Grant (Short Title: EMS Training) provides funding to recruit and train emergency medical services personnel in rural areas with a focus on addressing substance use disorders and co-occurring mental health conditions. Read more.

Areas of Focus: Treatment, Recovery & Harm Reduction

Amount of Funding: Award ceiling \$200,000

Project period: 1-year

Eligibility: Eligible applicants include rural emergency medical service agencies operated by local or tribal governments (fire-based and non-fire based) and nonprofit emergency medical service agencies.

HRSA: Rural Communities Opioid Response Program RCORP-Impact

Deadline: May 6, 2024

Purpose: The Rural Communities Opioid Response Program (RCORP)-Impact will improve access to treatment and recovery services for substance use disorder (SUD), including opioid use disorder (OUD). The program will serve people and families in rural areas affected by SUD.

HRSA plans to make approximately 16 awards <u>under RCORP – Impact</u>, which will improve access to integrated, coordinated treatment and recovery services for substance use disorder (SUD), including opioid use disorder (OUD), in rural areas. RCORP – Impact kicks off a new rural opioid treatment and recovery initiative under the umbrella of RCORP, which will focus on establishing new comprehensive substance use disorder treatment and recovery services in rural communities.

The grant can be used it to meet four main goals:

- 1. Set up and/or expand SUD treatment and recovery services
- 2. Build an SUD workforce that includes peer recovery specialists and clinicians with different areas of expertise
- Work with social services to ensure that people and families affected by SUD have a better chance for long-term recovery
- 4. Work to ensure that services can continue after the grant ends

Areas of Focus: Treatment and Recovery

Amount of Funding: \$750,000 each year

Project period: 4 years

Eligibility: You can apply if you're a public, private, non-profit, or for-profit group in the United States. This includes:

- Community-based organizations
- Native American tribal governments
- Native American tribal organizations
- State Offices of Rural Health
- State, local, and territorial governments
- Institutions of higher education
- Faith-based organizations

OJJDP: Opioid Affected Youth Initiative

Deadline: May 14, 2024

Purpose: OJJDP seeks to support the efforts of communities to develop prevention and intervention responses that identify, respond to, treat, and support children, youth, and families impacted by opioid use and other substance use disorders. OJJDP asks applicants to integrate youth and family partnership strategies into projects and partner with law enforcement, education, mental health service providers, child welfare agencies, community health agencies, and community-based organizations that address the needs of individuals and families experiencing substance use. OJP strongly encourages the use of data and evidence in program development for criminal justice, juvenile justice, and crime victim services.

Areas of Focus: Treatment and Recovery

Amount of Funding: \$750,000

Project period: Not specified

Eligibility: Eligible applicants are:

- State governments
- City or township governments
- Public- and state-controlled institutions of higher education
- County governments
- Other units of local government, such as towns, boroughs, parishes, villages, or other general purpose political subdivisions of a state
- Public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities
- Native American Tribal organizations (other than federally recognized Tribal governments)
- Native American Tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education
- Private institutions of higher education
- Independent school districts

An applicant may submit more than one application if each application proposes a different project in response to the solicitation. Also, an entity may be proposed as a subrecipient (subgrantee) in more than one application.

OJJDP will consider applications under which two or more entities (project partners) would carry out the federal award; however, only one entity may be the applicant for the solicitation. - Eligible applicants include 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, government agencies, or projects partnering with a nonprofit fiscal sponsor, including:
- Preference will be given to projects that are:
 - o Run by organizations that are peer-led or peer-driven
 - Led by or provided by peers such as a peer support specialist, peer navigator, peer coach, or recovery coach
 - o Proposed by organizations who already have experience providing recovery services
 - Responsive to the needs of people in recovery and their families through traumainformed programming
 - o Providing support and resources for the mental wellness of peers and staff
- Organizations must provide non-clinical programs that fall under SAMHSA's purpose and/or community dimensions of recovery:
 - Purpose Conducting meaningful daily activities such as employment, education, volunteering along with having the independence, income and resources to participate in society.
 - o Community Having relationships and social networks that provide support, friendship, love, and hope.
