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# Building Substance Use Disorder Treatment Capacity in Rural and Frontier Colorado

**Deadline:** May 17, 2024

**Purpose:** Signal seeks to contract with local governments, municipalities, counties, schools, law enforcement agencies, and primary care or substance use disorder treatment providers within or outside of the managed service organization's network of providers to receive grant funds to increase substance use disorder treatment services and capacity.

**Areas of Focus:** Treatment

**Amount of Funding:** \$950,000 available

**Project period:** July 1, 2024 - June 30, 2026

**Eligibility:** An applicant may receive funding consideration through this grant if it proposes to increase substance use disorder treatment services and capacity in rural or frontier counties, specifically for services that are unavailable or below needed capacity locally or regionally. This includes building a continuum of services, including, but not limited to, medical or clinical detoxification, residential treatment, intensive outpatient treatment and capital investment. In addition, applicants must materially meet the circumstances below: ● Other revenue sources to leverage requested grant funds for project, particularly for ongoing sustainability of services ● Local support/partnership for project Page 5 of 20 ● Supports geographic areas that are unserved or underserved ● Responds to a local economic need ● Other unique conditions

**Application Process:** Proposals should be submitted using Microsoft Word Open XML Format Document, produced in Word 2007 or later version (files with a file extension of .docx). Proposals must use 12-point Times New Roman font, single spacing, and one-inch margins. There is a 10-page limit which does not include any attachments or information required in appendices of this Application. The proposed budget should use the BHA capacity budget template in Excel Open XML Format, created in Excel 2007 or later versions (files with an extension of .xlsx). See Appendix B for the BHA capacity budget template. Do not submit proposals or budgets in a PDF format.

**Purpose:** The Marva Jean Jackson Rural Community Health Scholarship Grants award funding to encourage rural facilities and communities to develop or support local scholarship programs that will help pay for the training and education of local healthcare providers.

**Areas of Focus:** Workforce

**Amount of Funding:** Up to \$1,000

**Eligibility:** The applicant must be in a rural area and be a current organizational member of the Colorado Rural Health Center.

# Transitions in Care for Justice-Involved Populations (QIF-TJI)

**Deadline:** June 10, 2024

**Purpose:** The purpose of this funding opportunity is to strengthen transitions in care for individuals who will soon be released from incarceration, increasing their access to community-based, high-quality primary care services. Through this one-time investment, health centers will build upon existing evidence-based models to pilot innovative approaches that connect or reconnect justice-involved individuals reentering the community (JI-R) to in-scope health center services that address critical health and health-related social needs.

**Areas of Focus:** Justice

**Amount of Funding:** Up to \$1,000,000

**Eligibility:** Your organization must be a Health Center Program award recipient with an active H80 grant award to apply. Health Center Program award recipients are organizations funded under Section 330(e), (g), (h), and/or (i) of the Public Health Service Act.

**Application Process:** Apply in both systems:

1. [Grants.gov](https://www.grants.gov): Apply by 11:59 p.m. ET on June 10, 2024.

# Colorado Comprecare Fund

**Deadline:** June 14, 2024

**Purpose:** The Comprecare Fund provides grants for either program support and/or general operating support for organizations working toward optimal wellness for older adults in Colorado. This is a statewide fund, and organizations in rural and urban areas are encouraged to apply.

Awardees will be community-based projects that focus on helping older adults maintain their health through self-help and lifestyle changes. The fund has a broad definition of optimal wellness and will consider any project that addresses wellness.

**Areas of Focus:** Older Adults

**Amount of Funding:** \$7,500 - \$20,000

**Project period:** 1 year

**Eligibility:** Grants will be awarded primarily to 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations. Applicants must be located in or serve people living in Colorado. Government agencies may apply if they collaborate with a nonprofit and can demonstrate the community outcomes for seniors in the areas of physical health, good nutrition, and management of chronic health conditions.

# Colorado Supporting Healthy Minds and Youth Resiliency Grants

**Deadline:** Jun 15, 2024

**Purpose:** The Colorado Health Foundation provides grants for community-based projects and programs that help youth of color and LGBTQ youth cope with mental health challenges and build resiliency through identity, agency, belonging.

**Areas of Focus:** Youth Protective Factors

**Amount of Funding:** Award amounts are not stated. Applicants may request up to 2 years of funding.

**Eligibility:** Eligible applicants are 501 (c)(3) nonprofit organizations or public agencies in Colorado that engage youth in safe, supportive, and culturally responsive environments.

# Telligen Community Initiative Grants

**Deadline:** July 2, 2024

**Purpose:** The Telligen Community Initiative provides grants to programs and nonprofit organizations that are working in the areas of:

**Social determinants of health** - Supporting novel approaches that integrate childhood, family, and community health to advance optimal physical, mental, and social health and well-being for families, children and youth

**Healthcare workforce development** - Educate, recruit, and retain a diverse, high quality workforce that is geographically distributed and more accessible to vulnerable populations and communities

Priority is given to rural projects.

**Areas of Focus:** Social determinants of health, Workforce Development

**Amount of Funding:** Up to \$75,000

**Eligibility:** Eligible applicants are 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, accredited schools, and public/governmental agencies located in the states of Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, and Oklahoma.

**Application Process:** It is strongly recommended that potential applicants discuss their projects with staff prior to submission.

# OJJDP: Opioid Affected Youth Initiative

**Deadline:** May 14, 2024

**Purpose:** OJJDP seeks to support the efforts of communities to develop prevention and intervention responses that identify, respond to, treat, and support children, youth, and families impacted by opioid use and other substance use disorders. OJJDP asks applicants to integrate youth and family partnership strategies into projects and partner with law enforcement, education, mental health service providers, child welfare agencies, community health agencies, and community-based organizations that address the needs of individuals and families experiencing substance use. OJP strongly encourages the use of data and evidence in program development for criminal justice, juvenile justice, and crime victim services.

**Areas of Focus:** Treatment and Recovery

**Amount of Funding:** \$750,000

**Project period:** Not specified

**Eligibility:** Eligible applicants are:

- State governments
- City or township governments
- Public- and state-controlled institutions of higher education
- County governments
- Other units of local government, such as towns, boroughs, parishes, villages, or other general purpose political subdivisions of a state
- Public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities
- Native American Tribal organizations (other than federally recognized Tribal governments)
- Native American Tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education
- Private institutions of higher education
- Independent school districts

An applicant may submit more than one application if each application proposes a different project in response to the solicitation. Also, an entity may be proposed as a subrecipient (subgrantee) in more than one application. OJJDP will consider applications under which two or more entities (project partners) would carry out the federal award; however, only one entity may be the applicant for the solicitation. **Deadline:** June 15, 2024

**Purpose:** The Colorado Health Foundation will provide grants for culturally- and linguistically-responsive programs that support individuals with mental health and/or substance use challenges in accessing non-clinical support services close to home, thus making recovery possible. Projects should focus on the purpose and community dimensions in Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA's) model of recovery. [Read More](#).

**Areas of Focus:** Recovery

**Amount of Funding:** Not specified

**Project period:** Not specified

**Eligibility:**

- Eligible applicants include 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, government agencies, or projects partnering with a nonprofit fiscal sponsor, including:
- Preference will be given to projects that are:
  - Run by organizations that are peer-led or peer-driven
  - Led by or provided by peers such as a peer support specialist, peer navigator, peer coach, or recovery coach
  - Proposed by organizations who already have experience providing recovery services
  - Responsive to the needs of people in recovery and their families through trauma-informed programming
  - Providing support and resources for the mental wellness of peers and staff
- Organizations must provide non-clinical programs that fall under SAMHSA's purpose and/or community dimensions of recovery:
  - Purpose – Conducting meaningful daily activities such as employment, education, volunteering along with having the independence, income and resources to participate in society.
  - Community – Having relationships and social networks that provide support, friendship, love, and hope.
