## Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Use Site-Based Program

### Deadline: Jul 1, 2024

**Purpose**: The Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Use Site-Based Program (Short Title: COSSUP) provides grants to develop, implement, and/or expand comprehensive programs in response to the overdose crisis and the impact of illicit opioids, stimulants, or other substances. The program provides resources to support state, local, tribal, and territorial efforts to reduce substance misuse and overdose deaths, increase access to prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery services, and enhance public safety while supporting victims.

### Funds may be used for:

- Identifiable and accessible prescription drug take-back programs for unused controlled substances found in the home and used by hospitals and long-term care facilities
- Law enforcement and other first responder deflection and diversion programs
- Education and prevention programs to connect law enforcement agencies with K-12 students
- Comprehensive, real-time, regional information collection, analysis, and dissemination
- Naloxone for law enforcement and other first responders
- Substance use education and prevention programs to connect law enforcement agencies with K-12 students
- Pre-booking or post-booking treatment alternative-to-incarceration programs, such as pretrial, prosecutor, and court diversion or intervention programs, that serve individuals at high risk for overdose or SUD
- Court programming to prioritize and expedite treatment and recovery services to individuals at high risk for overdose
- Evidence-based treatment, harm reduction activities, and recovery support services that are well coordinated between in-custody and community-based providers
- Transitional or recovery housing and peer recovery support services
- Embedding social workers, peers, and persons with lived experience to help people navigate the justice system and connect them to treatment and recovery services
- Field-initiated projects that bring together justice, behavioral health, and public health to implement new or promising practices

Areas of Focus: Prevention, Harm Reduction, Treatment, And Recovery Services

Amount of Funding: \$1,000,000 in the rural/tribal subcategory

### Project period: 3 years

Eligibility: Eligible applicants are city, township, county, and federally recognized tribal governments.

# Jail-based Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) Mentor Site Initiative

### Deadline: Applications accepted on an ongoing basis

**Purpose**: The Jail-based MAT Mentor Site Initiative offers a peer-to-peer learning opportunity for jails interested in providing or enhancing medication-assisted treatment (MAT) services for individuals with substance use disorders (SUDs). Participants will be matched with a mentor site with experienced jail-based MAT programs and demonstrated success addressing SUDs. Mentor sites represent diverse settings, populations, and operational models, including those in rural and tribal areas.

Areas of Focus: Justice

Amount of Funding: Assistance is provided at no cost to program participants.

Eligibility: Jails in any local jurisdiction are eligible to apply as a mentee site.

# Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD) Training and Mentoring

### Deadline: Applications accepted on an ongoing basis

**Purpose**: This program provides free training and mentoring services for eligible healthcare providers to effectively use buprenorphine and other medications to treat opioid use disorder (OUD) in high-need communities. Completion of the training will count toward meeting MATE Act training requirements for practitioners registering for or renewing a DEA license. The training is free to complete, and is available in-person or online. The MD/DO training course is 8 hours, and the courses for nurse practitioners, physician assistants, and other advance practice nurses are 24 hours.

### Areas of Focus: Treatment

Amount of Funding: The course is provided at no cost to eligible clinicians.

**Eligibility**: Eligible participants have an active Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) number to dispense controlled substances and are one of the following:

- Physician (MD or DO)
- Nurse practitioner (NP)
- Physician assistant (PA)
- Certified nurse-midwife (CNM)
- Certified registered nurse anesthetist (CRNA)
- Medical students

### **Rural Hospital Stabilization Pilot Program**

### Deadline: Jul 07, 2024

**Purpose**: This program will help rural hospitals expand their services to meet community health needs while increasing their revenues. The program will achieve these goals by providing expert technical assistance to rural hospitals to conduct market assessments, determine ways to enhance existing service lines, and start new service lines to keep services locally. The program will also provide direct financial support to help with associate costs of service lines. This program will also have the affect of helping facilities address long-standing rural disparities.

Areas of Focus: Public Health

Amount of Funding: Total Program Funding - \$ 20,000,000

Project period: Start date - Sept 2014

- **Eligibility**: Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments)
- County governments
- City or township governments
- Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education

### **Colorado Comprecare Fund**

### Deadline: June 14, 2024

**Purpose**: The Comprecare Fund provides grants for either program support and/or general operating support for organizations working toward optimal wellness for older adults in Colorado. This is a statewide fund, and organizations in rural and urban areas are encouraged to apply.

Awardees will be community-based projects that focus on helping older adults maintain their health through self-help and lifestyle changes. The fund has a broad definition of optimal wellness and will consider any project that addresses wellness.

Areas of Focus: Older Adults

Amount of Funding: \$7,500 - \$20,000

Project period: 1 year

**Eligibility**: Grants will be awarded primarily to 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations. Applicants must be located in or serve people living in Colorado. Government agencies may apply if they collaborate with a nonprofit and can demonstrate the community outcomes for seniors in the areas of physical health, good nutrition, and management of chronic health conditions.

# **Colorado Supporting Healthy Minds and Youth Resiliency Grants**

Deadline: Jun 15, 2024

**Purpose**: The Colorado Health Foundation provides grants for community-based projects and programs that help youth of color and LGBTQ youth cope with mental health challenges and build resiliency through identity, agency, belonging.

Areas of Focus: Youth Protective Factors

Amount of Funding: Award amounts are not stated. Applicants may request up to 2 years of funding.

**Eligibility**: Eligible applicants are 501 (c)(3) nonprofit organizations or public agencies in Colorado that engage youth in safe, supportive, and culturally responsive environments.

### **Telligen Community Initiative Grants**

### Deadline: July 2, 2024

**Purpose**: The Telligen Community Initiative provides grants to programs and nonprofit organizations that are working in the areas of:

**Social determinants of health** - Supporting novel approaches that integrate childhood, family, and community health to advance optimal physical, mental, and social health and well-being for families, children and youth

**Healthcare workforce development** - Educate, recruit, and retain a diverse, high quality workforce that is geographically distributed and more accessible to vulnerable populations and communities

Priority is given to rural projects.

Areas of Focus: Social determinants of health, Workforce Development

Amount of Funding: Up to \$75,000

**Eligibility**: Eligible applicants are 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, accredited schools, and public/ governmental agencies located in the states of Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, and Oklahoma.

**Application Process**: It is strongly recommended that potential applicants discuss their projects with staff prior to submission.

# Supporting Coloradans in Recovery Through Non-Clinical Programs

### Deadline: June 15, 2024

**Purpose**: The Colorado Health Foundation will provide grants for culturally- and linguistically-responsive programs that support individuals with mental health and/or substance use challenges in accessing nonclinical support services close to home, thus making recovery possible. Projects should focus on the purpose and community dimensions in Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA's) model of recovery. <u>Read More</u>.

#### Amount of Funding: Not specified

### Project period: Not specified

### Eligibility:

- Eligible applicants include 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, government agencies, or projects partnering with a nonprofit fiscal sponsor, including:
- Preference will be given to projects that are:
  - Run by organizations that are peer-led or peer-driven
  - Led by or provided by peers such as a peer support specialist, peer navigator, peer coach, or recovery coach
  - o Proposed by organizations who already have experience providing recovery services
  - Responsive to the needs of people in recovery and their families through traumainformed programming
  - o Providing support and resources for the mental wellness of peers and staff
- Organizations must provide non-clinical programs that fall under SAMHSA's purpose and/or community dimensions of recovery:
  - Purpose Conducting meaningful daily activities such as employment, education, volunteering along with having the independence, income and resources to participate in society.
  - Community Having relationships and social networks that provide support, friendship, love, and hope.
