Supportive Residential Community Transitional Housing Provider

Deadline: July 31, 2024

Purpose: DOH is seeking an organization to provide transitional housing services and campus facilities and grounds operations for the Supportive Residential Community (SRC).

The desired impact of this RFP is to create a recovery-oriented transitional housing program that will reduce returns to homelessness, the justice system, hospitalization, etc., and to improve housing stability, increase positive health outcomes including reducing chronic substance use and reduce overall systems costs. The project will achieve this by focusing on individuals' recovery while pursuing permanent housing, employment and/or other resources needed to stabilize and reintegrate into the community of their choice.

Framework:

- Repurpose the Ridge View campus in Watkins, Colorado, into a recovery oriented community for
 individual adults without stable housing who wish to focus on recovery from a substance use
 disorder, which will provide low-barrier access to comprehensive care and treatments and will
 allow people to recover and heal in a safe and stable environment.
- Include multiple components to provide comprehensive support across a continuum of substance use recovery treatments and programming with the goal to have individuals leave the SRC in active recovery and improved health so they can transition to stable housing and community-based supports, as well as employment where possible.
- The purpose of SRC is to provide transitional housing, a continuum of behavioral health service treatment, medical care, vocational training, and skill development for its residents and the general public.
- Provide transitional housing for individual adults for up to two years with case management, care coordination, and vocational and housing placement assistance. The transitional housing program shall focus on:
 - o Operating and ensuring safe transitional housing
 - o Person-centered goal planning and care coordination
 - o Connecting individuals to medical and behavioral health care and well-being assistance
 - o Connecting individuals to permanent housing options in the community of their choice
 - Providing employment assistance such as vocational education and individual placement and support
 - O Connecting individuals to safety-net programs for which they are eligible, such as Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Medicaid/Medicare, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), housing voucher programs and unemployment insurance benefits

Areas of Focus: Recovery Housing

Amount of Funding: The Division has up to \$11,750,000 available for the costs associated with completing and reporting on the scope of work described in this RFP through December 31, 2026.

Application Process: Proposals must be received on or before the date and time specified in the VSS and BidNet Notices and this RFP (Section 1.23), regardless of delays, errors or mistakes made either intentionally or unintentionally, by the proposer in getting their proposal emailed to the identified purchasing agent and uploaded into the BidNet system by the deadline(s) stated in this RFP.

Opioid Crisis Innovation Challenge 2024

Deadline: August 8, 2024 (for concept note)

Purpose: FORE will provide grant support for specific projects that bring an innovative approach to long-standing and complex issues related to all aspects of stemming the tide of the nation's opioid crisis. This RFP targets projects which can explore and/or evaluate new "outsidethe-box" ideas, bring together approaches from several diverse fields, and engage multidisciplinary, cross-sector teams to solve some of the crisis' most intractable problems. Currently, this opportunity will focus on projects in the following three areas which, based on discussions with experts in the field, are widely recognized challenges to adequately address the opioid and overdose crisis with few examples of how to approach differently to accelerate improvements in reducing overdoses, increase access to treatment, and support long-term recovery:

- Innovative Payment Models
- Workforce Development
- Supporting the Transition from Treatment to Recovery

Areas of Focus: Workforce Development, Treatment & Recovery

Amount of Funding: Up to \$300,000/year for up to 2 years

Eligibility: Generally, FORE will consider grant requests for specific projects from U.S.-based public charities that are tax-exempt under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as well as from nonprofit, tax-exempt universities. The Foundation will also consider grant requests from state, local, and Native American tribal government units or agencies for specific charitable projects.

Application Process: The first step in the application process is to submit a short, structured Concept Note. FORE will evaluate all submitted Concept Notes for responsiveness to the RFP and alignment with FORE's mission and interests. Selected projects will be invited to submit a Full Proposal, which consists of a brief proposal, line-item budget, as well as required organizational documents. Applicants will have up to four weeks from notification to submit the Full Proposal.

Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD) Training and Mentoring

Deadline: Applications accepted on an ongoing basis

Purpose: This program provides free training and mentoring services for eligible healthcare providers to effectively use buprenorphine and other medications to treat opioid use disorder (OUD) in high-need communities. Completion of the training will count toward meeting MATE Act training requirements for practitioners registering for or renewing a DEA license. The training is free to complete, and is available in-person or online. The MD/DO training course is 8 hours, and the courses for nurse practitioners, physician assistants, and other advance practice nurses are 24 hours.

Areas of Focus: Treatment

Amount of Funding: The course is provided at no cost to eligible clinicians.

Eligibility: Eligible participants have an active Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) number to dispense controlled substances and are one of the following:

- Physician (MD or DO)
- Nurse practitioner (NP)
- Physician assistant (PA)
- Certified nurse-midwife (CNM)
- Certified registered nurse anesthetist (CRNA)
- Medical students

Rural Hospital Stabilization Pilot Program

Deadline: Jul 07, 2024

Purpose: This program will help rural hospitals expand their services to meet community health needs while increasing their revenues. The program will achieve these goals by providing expert technical assistance to rural hospitals to conduct market assessments, determine ways to enhance existing service lines, and start new service lines to keep services locally. The program will also provide direct financial support to help with associate costs of service lines. This program will also have the affect of helping facilities address long-standing rural disparities.

Areas of Focus: Public Health

Amount of Funding: Total Program Funding - \$ 20,000,000

Project period: Start date - Sept 2014

• **Eligibility**: Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments)

• County governments

• City or township governments

• Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education
